Editorial

Independent Methodist Churches Statement of

SALVATION - We believe that salvation from the guilt, penalty and power of sin to eternal life is a free gift of God.

Salvation is His purpose for all mankind and is only possible through personal faith in the atoning work of the Lord Jesus Christ. We believe that all must stand before the final judgement of Christ and that those who have refused His salvation will be separated eternally from God.

Last time I concentrated on the first two parts of this section of the IM Statement of Faith. To summarise what we have learnt so far. mankind is naturally sinful and is incapable of rescuing itself from sin and its consequences. However, God decided that mankind couldn't be left in a state of everlasting sinfulness, and decided to do something about it, by sending Jesus - the man who is God, as Graham Kendrick put it - to take the penalty of sin on himself. All that man has to do is to believe in Jesus, to receive the gift of eternal life. It isn't something we deserve, or something that we can earn by our own efforts, and although God's perfect will is that all mankind should be saved, he has given us free will so that we must choose whether or not to accept it. 'Nothing in my hands I bring, simply to thy cross I cling', as Augustus Montague Toplady wrote in the hymn Rock of ages.

We also looked at Matthew's account of the parable of the wedding banquet (Matthew 22:1-14), and considered the man who had got into the wedding feast in his own clothes. This is a picture of someone who chose to be different. He rejected the special wedding costume that the host had provided for his guests (remembering that those who had been brought in off the streets would have probably been in shabby, not to mention smelly garb) and decided that what he was wearing would be good enough. It wasn't, and it isn't. If you choose to reject the salvation that Jesus offers and trust in your own goodness, it won't work and there is no alternative.

The third part of this clause reminds us that we must all stand before Christ at the final judgement. Those who believe that this life is all there is will have an unpleasant surprise. Hebrews 9:27 tells us that '...man is destined to die once, and after that to face judgement', and Paul wrote to the Corinthians that '... we must all appear before the judgement seat of Christ, that each one may receive what is due to him for the things done while in the body, whether good or bad ' (2 Corinthians 5:10).

We need to be careful how we interpret this as it applies to the Christian. I used to worry that it meant that everything wrong that I had ever done would be broadcast to the whole of mankind, saved and unsaved.

After all, Jesus told his disciples that '... there is nothing concealed that will not be disclosed, or hidden that will not be made known' (Matthew 10:26). Does that mean that my sins, whether clear and obvious or seemingly well-covered, will be made known to everyone so that, in eternity, people can 'tut, tut' for evermore? No. When God's planned new covenant was announced to an unrepentant Israel (Jeremiah 31:31-34), the Lord said '... I will forgive their wickedness, and will remember their sins no more' - verses that are repeated in Hebrews 8 and Hebrews 10. Just to emphasise this, David wrote that '... as far as the east is from the west, so far has he removed our transgressions from us' (Psalm 103:12), and Micah prophesied that God would '... hurl all our iniquities into the depths of the sea' (Micah 7:19). With all these promises, we can be confident that God will not dredge up all our misdeeds for one final occasion on Judgement Day. So what does it mean? Firstly, we must remember Romans 8:1 - There is now no condemnation for those that are in Christ Jesus. Secondly, what we are talking about is not the judgement of believers but the judgement of believers' works, described in 1 Corinthians 3:10-15. However, what this is saying is that the quality of what we have done in our Christian lives will be assessed gold, silver and precious stones will survive the test by fire: wood, hay and stubble (as the Authorised Version puts it) will not, and the extent to which our works survive the test will determine what rewards we will receive in heaven. He himself will be saved (v.15) - our salvation is not in question, we do not have to stand before Jesus in fear of our eternal lives.





What, though, of the unbeliever? We saw in Hebrews 9:27 that man is destined to face judgement though, for the believer, the judgement is of his works rather than him. Revelation 20:11-15 give a picture of the final judgement, with Jesus sitting on a great white throne. Books were opened ... another book was opened, which is the book of life ... the dead were judged according to what they had done as recorded in the books ... if anyone's name was not found written in the book of life, he was thrown into the lake of fire. Go back to John 3:18, which has been quoted several times in this series. Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe stands condemned already, because he has not believed in the name of God's only begotten Son. If you have believed on the Lord Jesus Christ, your name is written in the Book of Life. If you haven't, it isn't. That, rather than the individual's deeds or misdeeds, is the criterion for being thrown into the lake of fire. Everlasting separation from God. As has been said so many times, if you reject God's offer of salvation through belief in Jesus' atoning death on the cross, there is no Plan B, no other way. But, for us who believe, there is the promise of being welcomed into Jesus' presence - well done, good and faithful servant.






Alan Johnson (11 May 1934 - 3 June 2025)

CHURCH F@CUS

Appleton Independent Methodist Church, known locally simply as AIM Church, is one of the newest churches in the Connexion. Unlike most of our churches, it does not have its own premises but meets in the local parish hall. It was in 1986, when new housing developments began to grow in Appleton, that a small group of Christians (including former Connexional President Gordon Gleave), moving into the area, realised that it didn't have immediate local access to a church. After praying about



the situation and following God's guidance, a church was planted, and a suitable place to meet was sought. Appleton Parish Hall became the new home for the brand-new AIM Church. The first service was held on the 13th September 1987 and the church has been meeting there every week since.



AIM Church identifies three important principles for spiritual growth: "Bible Based, Prayer Orientated and Spirit Led". This phrase was coined by one of the founding members and has always been at their heart. The church has always placed great emphasis on reaching out to the community, believing that the Good News about Jesus is life-changing and their privilege and responsibility to share.

AIM's outreach today takes a number of forms. Every Tuesday, there is a coffee morning in the Parish Hall from 10.00 to 12.00, with complementary coffee, tea and cake available. People come together to meet their friends and to make new ones. Many people look forward to the weekly meetings, indeed for some it is the only time they get out of the house. For the more energetic

(i.e. not your editor!), there is a weekly Run Club, on Mondays at 18.00. After burning the calories, there is often a chance to put them back on when the participants go for a meal afterwards, this being an opportunity to chat, get to know people and, when appropriate, share the Gospel with them. Less strenuous is the AIM Community Book Club, held on the last Tuesday of each month at the home of one of the church leaders. Members begin reading a particular book, and come together to share what they have gleaned from reading it.





Family services take place every Sunday at 11.00, with the change for a 'cuppa and catch-up' from 10.30. Worship times include both traditional and modern music and songs, and members are encouraged to take part in the services, by sharing, praying and exercising the gifts God has given them. There are also two house-groups that meet midweek, one in Appleton itself and the other in Grappenhall, giving a further opportunity to pray, praise and study God's Word.

Appleton Cross

In recent years, there have been plans for a major urban development in the South Warrington area, which could see up to 2,400 new homes built by 2039. Initially, planning permission was granted for 370 new homes as well as a local centre, which would include a church and community hub that was included in the plans at the request of AIM Church. The vision for the church building includes multi-purpose meeting rooms for use by other community groups, a café, community hall and other



facilities. AIM Church is currently working with the developer to confirm the final size and design of the new building. The business plan states that 'the building has been designed to facilitate the best expression of what church should be - a dynamic, welcoming space for the whole community to do life together, shaped to support spiritual, mental and physical well-being.

A consultation by Homes England found that the most-wanted features of the local centre were community facilities and food / beverage, both of which are included in the vision. AIM Church's vision for the new facility is both exciting and challenging. Exciting, because it represents an opportunity for outreach and growing God's Kingdom that so rarely comes our way. Challenging, because of the scale of the project, things that still



need to be finalised (such as finance!) and, when the time comes, starting the new church plant while retaining the existing ministry at Appleton. AIM Church will be holding these matters in prayer in the weeks and months to come: will you join your prayers with theirs?



A lively ukulele band based at Mount Zion Church, Cliviger, will be extremely busy over the Christmas period, with performances at rest homes, to local groups, and a major selection of carols at the Musical Memories group which uses music to help those suffering from Alzheimer's disease.

The group, led by its founder, Alan Scholes, finds they have at least a couple of bookings a month at special events in aid of the hospice, entertaining in residential homes, churches, and fund-raising charity events.

"It is nice to feel the group is appreciated and can help in these different ways", said Alan. He started the group six years ago and it now has more than 30 members, with an average of 25 at the Monday night practice sessions.

He is delighted that over the years they have had at least 60 people of all ages involved, with several beginners' groups introducing the art of playing to young and old, men and women. "It is a lovely instrument, fairly easy to learn, very practical to carry to performances, and we attract a wide range of age groups, both male and female. Interestingly some mothers bring children to learn and then decide to have a go themselves".

Alan taught himself to play the ukulele ten years ago, as a change from the guitar to which he was introduced by a fellow student with whom he shared a room at Didsbury Teacher Training College.

He and his wife Pauline, a pianist, joined the Burnley Evangelical Schools Trust which had been formed some ten years before by a leader from a nearby church. They took school assemblies and lunchtime clubs in 35 schools and nurseries all over the area, often leading up to 16 sessions a week.



When they retired from BEST after ten years, music was still an important part of Alan's life as he regularly led worship at the church and performed at other events in various residential homes. It was useful when he and Pauline continued to take assemblies and music sessions at St John's Primary School in Cliviger. The school also had a ukulele class and that gave him the idea to start a beginners' group at the church which he had attended all his life.

Alan, now 79 years old, started teaching chemistry at Barden High School, Burnley, where he stayed for 32 years, before retiring at the age of 50.



When he celebrated his 70th birthday at the church he did it with a song on his lips. In fact, 70 hymns and songs - a five-hour marathon, when the ukulele and guitar figured as he raised more than £1,000 towards an extension fund at the church.

Alan regularly leads worship at the church and occasionally the ukule-le appears.

"It is a lovely instrument and lends itself to many musical opportunities", he explained.

"The group play all kinds of music from the 1920s like 'Yes sir, that's my baby', music from the 50s and 60s (such as 'Rock around the clock'), and many of the popular hymns".

"We have a wide range of music, and some members who might not manage the ukulele play the wash-board or even tambourines", he added. "There is something for everyone".



Long Lane Liverpool





September 20th was an important date in the calendar for the church at Long Lane, Liverpool and for Carrie O'Nions. After four years of study and essays, she completed the Ministers Course to be a fully-accredited Minister of the I.M. Connexion.

The church was bedecked with gifts for the Harvest on the Sunday,



WORLD MISSION NEWS

(Overseas Missions is now changing its name to World Missions)

L. and P. are still seeking God's guidance for their future ministry in North Africa. Their aim is to see a healthy, resilient church in their community with participating leadership from local people that will draw others to Jesus. It remains impossible for Christian workers to have residency without some professional activity. Whereas L. still has that recognition, the end of P.'s work in rural development now presents a problem. On the plus side, his work gave him access to many people who had opportunities to hear the word. Also, their team in the town is growing, with several young couples in the process of joining the work there. However, their friends Alan and Katie have now relocated to Australia – they will be a miss. L. has recently contributed to a book "Your Story Matters – The God Stories", currently available on Amazon. Meanwhile, they are continuing to pray for God's leading for the future, as well as His ongoing provision, as P. has not only lost the funding for his former project, but also that of his main supporting church in France.

Gail and Daniel Castro have now resigned from their mission association OMS, as they are taking up new roles in ministry. As a result they will no longer be serving as IM missionaries. We thank them for their years of ministry, first in Colombia, then in Spain and more recently here in the UK and praise the Lord for the way He has led them over these long years and used them in His service. We wish them well and pray that He will continue to lead and bless them in their future calling.



David Robinson is well-known throughout the Independent Methodist Connexion. A member and minister at Stretford church (now closed) and latterly Roe Green, he served as a missionary with OMF for many years, initially in Thailand and then in Cambodia.

David's book begins with his coming to Jesus at a Billy Graham crusade at Maine Road (the old Manchester City ground) while he was an apprentice at AEI in Trafford Park. A few years later, at the 1965 Keswick convention, he was challenged to become a missionary. His first response was that he had another five years left on his contract, having been sponsored on an engineering degree by his employer. God's answer to this – and several other objections over the years – was simply, "That's not your problem, that's my problem". How often do we make excuses instead of letting God sort out the practical difficulties that cause us concern?

David met Jenny in 1968 and they got engaged the following year. Recognising that, if they bought a house and settled down, they would probably never enter into overseas mission, they decided to leave their respective jobs that August, get married the next month and go to Bible college ten days later!

Although their savings only covered their costs for the first year, God provided for their second year by a combination of a Government grant and gifts from friends. Over the years, God was to prove his faithfulness in many situations, not least after Jenny's passing and David's doubts about returning to the mission field.

Instead of returning to Thailand, David was asked to lead a small missionary team in Cambodia: during that time he met and later married Mary, who had been working for OMF as a physiotherapist and evangelist in Thailand. Their work in Cambodia continued until 2005, when they returned to England and, to his surprise, David was asked to become interim director of the UK North Region. Following that, David and Mary were encouraged to begin a work amongst the expatriate Thai community in Britain. Today, the Network of Thai Christians in the UK (NTC) consists of 15 groups in England and two in Scotland.

That title - it refers to the three countries where David has served the Lord: mud in Thailand (rain often makes cross-country travel difficult or impossible); bullets (Cambodia was only beginning to recover from the Khmer Rouge period and subsequent occupation by Vietnam); and open roads for David's current ministry supporting those groups of Thai believers in the UK.

OMF UK With the national office increased mission mobilization.



Are you aware that IM congregations have distributed an incredible accumulative total of 52,030 Living Word calendars across the nation in 15 the last 20 years? Last Christmas/New Year alone,- nearly 1300 evangelistic calendars were distributed via IM Connexion churches throughout the British Isles. This project is being repeated this year and IM church secretaries are currently receiving full details and order forms in their regular mailings from the Resource Centre.
